### What type of shadowing did you do?

### What type of volunteering did you do?

I did a lot of volunteering through my sorority. I participated in Backpack Buddies where we package food for children to have during the weekends when they are not in school so they have something to eat. I have volunteered at the Food Bank in Greenville, the Humane Society of ENC, and many other places in the Greenville/Winterville area. Through NSSHLA, I had the opportunity to volunteer through Duke Hears, which is an organization that helps educate parents who have deaf or hard of hearing children. I volunteered to lead a group of children around the Museum of Math and Science in Durham, NC while their parents were participating in seminars and workshops.

#### DId you do research? If so, what was the topic?

I did participate in research. I volunteered in Dr. Heather Harris Wright's Aging Adult Language Disorders lab. My research looked at discourse characteristics in individuals who had Parkinson's disease.

My most rewarding experience at ECU was the personal growth I experienced. I learned so much about myself while in Greenville and for that I will forever be grateful.
